Old Business: Julia Khoury reported on volunteer hours. We had 4331 volunteer hours, 1049 education hrs, and 36,057 contacts for 2009.

Doug Quicksall reported that the financial records were reviewed for 2009 by the audit committee and approved.

MG increases TSTC scholarships

Nine TSTC students in the Landscape Horticulture program have received \$200 MG scholarships since we started the project in 2007 reports Ila Jean Carothers who coordinates the project. We started with \$600 contributions in 2007 and 2008. In 2009 we increased the amount to \$1500 for a total \$2700. In Jan. 2010 we voted to raise the contribution to \$2000. Funds are earmarked for textbooks. Students are selected by staff.

- We contributed over 4,000 volunteer hours in 2009 in McLennan County? Using 2008 wage figures of \$20.25 per hour, that translates to \$74,580* worth of assistance to the McLennan County AgriLife Extension Service.

Be diligent in reporting your volunteer hours. They make a big difference to our community.
- We had our first plant sale in May 2003 with \$768 in profits - all from our own showcase plants. Profits from the 2009 sale were over \$3,000 in spite of pouring rain and chilly temperatures.

- We were one of the first TMG groups to do a four-year rose trial to determine which roses meet the requirements for the EarthKind designation. A new demonstration garden is underway at the HOT fairgrounds to showcase EarthKind roses.
